MCPA Lawsuit Update

As you are aware, the opposition has two lawsuits against Minnesota Citizens Personal Protection Act (MCPA). Those lawsuits put our new carry permit system in limbo.

One lawsuit claims the "guns banned" signs infringe on religious liberty. Another claims MCPA was passed by the legislature using an unconstitutional means.

In the second case, MCPA was declared unconstitutional by a Ramsey County District judge. This lawsuit is under appeal to the Minnesota Court of Appeals. Oral arguments are expected in late October during November.

CCRN! has filed a "friend of the court" briefs supporting MCPA. These legal briefs highlight facts and precedent that will help us win.

It is unlikely the lawsuits will be settled by Election Day. We'll go through the courts first, and the legislature again (if we have to).

And yes, your carry permit is still good while the courts work away.

Stopping Judicial High-Jacking

The recent high-jacking of the legislative process by the stroke of a single judge's pen serves as a warning to all Minnesotans, regardless of what they think about the Minnesota Citizens Personal Protection Act (MCPA).

When a judge declared MCPA unconstitutional, he thumbed his nose at 5 million Minnesota citizens. The judge didn't like the law, will of the people be damned. And he justified his ruling not by faulting the law itself, but by attacking the manner in which it was passed.

Never mind that MCPA has worked effectively for a year and a half. Never mind that countless other Minnesota laws have been passed in the very same way. Never mind that MCPA has been debated openly and publicly for over eight years. One ruling and Presto-Change-o! MCPA is placed in limbo until a more sensible appeals court overturns this decision.

In this election year, Minnesotans (and gun owners in particular) should send a message to candidates by supporting those who favor having judges who believe in interpreting the law, instead of "legislating from the bench."

Shooting Range Preservation

Be honest. How many shooting ranges can you or your friends remember being closed over the past five years? How many new ranges have opened in your county during the same period? Thought so.

Across the nation, shooting facilities are disappearing. Sometimes these are closed voluntarily, as land becomes too expensive to resist selling, or more often, these are simply "zoned out" of existence by over-zealous county boards, city councils, and other officials who cave-in to developers wanting to build near ranges, even when the ranges had been there for decades.

Shooting Range Preservation legislation is vital to Minnesota. And it continues to be stalled in the legislature. County and city associations are trying to "fine-tune" the bill to death, in hope that it just "goes away." That's not acceptable.

Minnesota is a state of outdoorsmen and outdoorswomen. Whether we're a hunter, casual shooter, or carry permit holder, we all need a place to practice. And without adequate ranges, we'll never be able to teach the next generation of shooters about firearm safety, shooting skill development, and love of the outdoors.

Before you vote, ask your candidates whether they support Shooting Range Preservation.

Goodbye Federal "Assault Weapons" Ban; Hello Minnesota "Assault Weapons" Ban

The federal law banning so-called "assault weapons" sunset this year. Good riddance to a feel-good law that did nothing.

The opposition doesn't feel good about that. Expect them to try a new "assault weapons" ban at the state level in Minnesota during 2005.

What helps us is this: Those that support the Minnesota Citizens Personal Protection Act (MCPA) will oppose a Minnesota "assault weapons" ban. And those who've waffled on MCPA will probably support an "assault weapons" ban.

John Kerry on Firearms

Is a picture worth one thousand words?



John Kerry, pictured giving the "thumbs up" after voting to extend the silly "Assault Weapons Ban" along with Senators Schumer (New York), Feinstein (California) and Kennedy (Massachusetts), all his co-authors. Much more than a mere extension, the bill would add new restrictions on semi-autos that would threaten hunters who own many common hunting rifles and shotguns.

President Bush on Firearms

As Governor of Texas, George Bush signed that state's Concealed Handgun Law. He also spent one million dollars to give away trigger locks. As President, his approach to gun control has been to pick and choose, based on a fundamental belief that gun ownership is a guaranteed Second Amendment right and that personal (and parental) responsibility is a core value. That said, Bush's core beliefs seem fuzzy but are remarkably consistent:

-- President Bush agreed to sign an Assault Weapons Ban (AWB) bill, and voiced a willingness to sign an even more restrictive extension of the ban on assault weapons.

-- On the other hand, President Bush did not push the AWB, but instead left Congress to decide. Congress let AWB sunset.

-- Stronger enforcement of existing firearm laws (such as Virginia's Project Exile) and instant background checks at gun shows.

For a Senator who has been absent from numerous floor votes, absent from security briefings, and absent from the hunting community except during elections, John Kerry somehow found time to cast 59 anti-gun owner votes on firearms bills, including votes on firearm bans (voting nine times to ban some or all semi-automatic firearms), ammunition bans (on calibers used for hunting that Kennedy and Kerry claimed also penetrated soft body armor) waiting periods, additional restriction on gun shows, and increased restrictions and costs on FFL holders. Kerry also voted to close over 1,000,000 acres to hunting.

Fortunately, firearm enthusiasts have been given some telling glimpses into John Kerry's almost comical lack of knowledge when it comes to firearms and hunting:

"Probably I'd have to say deer... I go out with my trusty 12-gauge double-barrel, crawl around on my stomach." [And from the] October edition of Outdoor Life... When asked about their favorite guns, President Bush responds: "My favorite gun is a Weatherby Athena 20 gauge."

-- Has kept private sales of firearms private. FFL sales at gun shows still undergo background checks. (No change from present law.)

-- Opposes government mandated registration of all firearms owned by law-abiding citizens. (No change.)

-- No registration at the federal level. (Again, no change.)

-- He clearly opposes manufacturer liability lawsuits. That's important, for such lawsuits affect all gun owners, from raising homeowners insurance rates to a hidden "lawsuit tax" that raises the price of firearms and ammunition.

-- He supported a "clean" manufacturer protection bill, without add-ons that violate the rights of firearm enthusiasts.

-- He clearly supports concealed carry and the "individual right" interpretation of the Second Amendment

Further, the administration's top Supreme

Mr. Kerry says (reminding us yet again where he was 35 years ago): "My favorite gun is the M-16 that saved my life and that of my crew in Vietnam. I don't own one of those now, but one of my reminders of my service is a Communist Chinese assault rifle." So Mr. Kerry's favorite gun is an "assault" rifle designed for war. Funny talk coming from a guy who just went ballistic over the end of the "assault" weapons ban. (Wall Street Journal 9/17/2004 pg13)

Even the NRA calls Kerry "[The] most anti-gun Presidential nominee in United States history".

The bottom line is that gun owners have to worry about John Kerry. He may have "flip-flopped" on every other issue, but when it comes to gun owners, he has proven to be alarmingly consistent: He votes against you.

Consider that when you go to the ballot box this year.

Court lawyer, Solicitor General Theodore Olson, has said: "The current position of the United States... is that the Second Amendment more broadly protects the rights of individuals, including persons who are not members of any militia or engaged in active military service or training, to possess and bear their own firearms."

And most importantly: It is certain the next President will appoint two to four justices to the Supreme Court. It is clear that George Bush's Supreme Court appointments will be more likely to support an "individual right" interpretation of the Second Amendment.

It is also very likely the Supreme Court will hear a Second Amendment case sometime in the next four years.

And here in Minnesota, a single judge was able to thwart the will of Minnesota's five million citizens.

About CCRN! Grades

Grades are determined from answers to questions in the CCRN! Candidate Survey, past votes, public statements, and reports from CCRN! members.

These grades are information for you to use when making your choices this election year. Grades are:

A+: Leads the way for gun owners and sportsman in Minnesota (very few qualify for this grade).

A: A stalwart supporter of Minnesota gun owners and sportsman.

B: Can be expected to support Minnesota gun owners and sportsman, but is not yet a proven "A-team" member.

C: Not necessarily a passing grade. Has ignored Minnesota gun owners and sportsman in the past.

D: Not acceptable and not a friend of gun owners.

F: Hostile to sportsman and gun owner civil rights.

F*: Probably hostile to Minnesota sportsman and gun owners: refused to return the CCRN! survey.

Judicial Candidates Grades; Hennepin County: Steve Baker gets an A

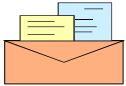
